## WATCH THIS SPACE! / MURALS ON A MISSION

Erica is a Year 12 student at Marsden High and School Captain for 2012. Erica is partnering with the City of Ryde and the Salvation Army Oasis Youth Support Network to work on producing 4 murals on hoarding that will be displayed in the local West Ryde area. The murals themselves, while themed around crime prevention, will be a combination of Erica's vision under the guidance of professional artists, creatively assisted by local high school students from Oasis's Youth Connections Group.

Erica's community service project is a part of the Club 6 Max Potential Program. Max Potential, a 22 week program that pairs up students from local schools with business leaders from local clubs. "At first I was unsure about what this program was about but after seeing what Max Potential has offered to my life, personal leadership skills, confidence, time management and witnessing the change throughout all areas of my life, I'm so grateful to have been a part of this opportunity of a lifetime."

Jo Luke of Ryde-Eastwood Leagues Club and Erica's coach said; "Essentially Max Potential connects community leaders with emerging young leaders to assist them to reach their maximum potential. This is achieved largely through work on a community service project. I'm thrilled to be involved in something so community minded."

This community service project brings together local youth to not just raise community awareness about crime in our area, but to lend some visual and artistic enrichment to the West Ryde area and to provide an opportunity for that

youth to own and contribute something meaningful.

While initial meetings for the planning stages have already been held; the first workshop & official launch of the project will the in the week of the 31<sup>st</sup> of October with the City Of Ryde, The Salvation Army Oasis Youth Support Network, Erica S. & the two artist. "We're really excited to get things underway... we aim to have the project completed by early December." Erica commented.



While the exact location for the murals is yet to be determined, this project holds a lot of promise in making West Ryde not just a safer environment, but a place where the artistic talents of local youth can be on display for the whole community.

Marsden High Schools Principal, Ms Denise Lofts said "I was very excited to learn about Erica's community service project, not just for Erica but for the whole Marsden High community. A project of this magnitude will not only allow Erica to develop her personal and positional leadership skills, but will give other students the opportunity to express themselves creatively and give something to the West Ryde community that will undoubtedly change the perceptions of how the wider community views youth".

Erica mentioned her appreciation & excitement for the coming months. "I'm really honoured to be a part of Max Potential and so thankful for the opportunity that Ryde-Eastwood Leagues Clubs has provided through their sponsorship. The next couple months are going to be so fun & worthwhile! I really hope that the community will be able enjoy the hoardings we create."

#### **Moving Your Results to the Next Level**

#### Level 1:

It is pretty hard to get decent marks if you aren't doing at least the three 'E's on Level 1:

- ENROLMENT: coming to school every day, attending every lesson.
- EQUIPMENT: coming to class with textbooks, writing paper, pens.
- ENGAGEMENT: working in the classroom, trying your best, doing what you are asked to do.

#### Level 2:

Got the basics under control and ready to move your results to this next level?

Then this is what you need to do next:

- COMPLETING SET HOMEWORK: Your teachers are giving you this work for a reason! To help you understand the subject better. It makes sense to put a bit of effort in to do this work.
- PARTICIPATING IN CLASS / ASKING FOR HELP: By participating it helps you understand better in class which means less work to do at home. It is also important to ask for help from your teachers if you do not understand something.
- HOME STUDY ENVIRONMENT /
   ORGANISING RESOURCES: It is
   important you can find everything you
   need when you need it. Consider how
   you have set up your workspace, how
   you manage all the paper and all of the
   digital resources you receive in the
   senior years.

#### Level 3

Now that you have got things set up, time to make your life easier, and your study more effective, with the techniques on this next level.

PREPARING FOR ASSESSMENTS:
 Use a Term Planner or Term Calendar so you can clearly see when assessments are due.

Use a Diary to help plan for assessments - make a plan of work and keep track of what you have done.

 WORKING EFFICIENTLY AT HOME: Working in half hour blocks with no distractions.

Making a study plan or study timetable. Making a plan each afternoon before you leave school.

Using software such as 'Self-Control' and 'Freedom'.

Separating school work and personal time. Allocating set times to schoolwork.

- USING THE 1,2,3 STUDY METHOD: Avoid just reading your notes over and over. Avoid leaving study until the last minute. Instead, this is how you study in the senior years:
- 1. MAKE STUDY NOTES
  2. LEARN THE NOTES BY TESTING YOURSELF ON THEM
  3. DO LOTS OF QUESTIONS TO PRACTISE YOUR SKILLS.

#### Level 4:

So you have decided to go all out and aim for great marks. Well done you! The nice thing about school is that it rewards hard work and effort, you don't have to be a genius, you just have to get stuck into it. If you are ready to move your results to the next level, here are your next steps.

- MAKING STUDY NOTES EARLY:
   Don't wait until exam time. Make your study notes as you go, often at the end of a topic or section or every few weeks.
   File away your study notes when complete so they are ready for exams.
   Try advanced forms of note-making.
- USING A WIDE VARIETY OF STUDY TECHNIQUES:

The more different ways you interact with the information you are trying to learn the better chance you have of retaining this info

Explore which study techniques are most suited to your style of learning.

AIM FOR 2-3 HOURS OF SCHOOLWORK PER NIGHT (FOR SENIORS): Do homework first.

Then work on assessments.

If you still have time, continue with work on study notes.

If notes are up-to-date, think what else you could do to improve your understanding of the subject, study guides, practice papers, revision books, practice essays.
