#### **Year 11 Crossroads Camp**

As a part of the Stage 6 requirements, all students in Year 11 are required to complete the Department of Education Crossroads course. Crossroads is a 25 hour course that is mandatory for all students in Year 11 that focuses on the personal development and health of students.

Crossroads aims to support senior students as they address issues related to identity, independence and the changing responsibilities they face. In Crossroads, students have the opportunity to develop knowledge, understandings and skills to enable them to make informed decisions about issues which are pertinent to them.

Marsden High School has decided to run this course as a compulsory camp for all Year 11 students during Term 2. The camp will be at Jamberoo Valley Lodge on the 1st-3<sup>rd</sup> June and will be an excellent opportunity for students to build upon their existing relationships and test themselves on a range of initiative and challenge activities.

The cost of the camp is estimated at \$290 including meals, transport, accommodation at the lodge and all activities. Students can start making payments towards this camp from Monday 21<sup>st</sup> April at the front office. A parent and student information night has been organised for Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> April in the school hall at 6.30pm to further discuss this course. The course operator, lan Bradburn of Optimum Experiences will also be present to discuss the activities and the benefits of this course.

#### Year 7 - 11 Ski Trip

This year there is an opportunity for all students in Years 7 – 11 to attend a Ski Trip to Thredbo Ski Resort. The trip will take place during the first few weeks of Term 3 and will run from Sunday to Wednesday. All students will have a choice of Skiing or Snowboarding and will be provided with a 2 hour lesson each day by qualified Thredbo instructors.

An information night for both parents and students will be held on Thursday 7th April at 7.15pm in the school hall where an itinerary, what to bring list and permission note will be issued.

#### **CAREERS NEWS**

#### **Eligibility for Youth Allowance**

When your dependent child reaches the age of 16 they may be eligible to receive Youth Allowance (YA) depending on a number of criteria. These include the following:

- 1 Parental Income The lower threshold for parental income to receive the maximum YA is \$45,114 and the highest threshold is \$150,000. These amounts of parental income represent the combined income of both parents/guardians. The rate of YA will decrease for every \$1 over the minimum threshold.
- 2 Number of students in the family
- Studying circumstances of the student(s)if living at home or away to study.

Some of the benefits available to students on Youth Allowance include reduced fees at TAFE (\$52) and Education Scholarships worth approx \$2,000 per annum for students attending university.

To work out how much support you may be entitled to with YA; you can use the <u>Student Assistance Estimator</u> which is located on the Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations website, <u>www.deewr.gov.au</u>.


#### **NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY**

#### **WELFARE**

It is hard to believe that Term 1 is already effectively over! It has been a tumultuous start to 2011. Floods in Queensland and Victoria, the earthquake in Christchurch. Earthquakes, a tsunami and a nuclear accident in Japan! Sydney and Marsden have been a relative island of peace and stability in the midst of so much turmoil and bad news.

Sometime though even in classes here students especially Year 7 students ask and wonder aloud about the perceived threats of these occurrences. I recently attended a presentation by Dr Michael Carr- Gregg a child psychologist and commentator on adolescent issues on shows such as Sunrise. He remarked that the first few months of this year has seen a steep spike in referrals for counselling and wondered if the events of this year had any ripple effect on his referrals. There are according to his view 4 worlds of the adolescent. The influences of Family, Peers, School and a Inner world of influence. Added to this has increasingly been media and given most adolescents use of new technology he titles this the Digital world.

The bombardment of images may affect sensitive adolescents. Advice is if they want let them talk, be aware to try to give facts such as Australia is a relatively safe place from earthquakes and tsunamis (although historically we have had both to a lesser degree) and reassure and try to assure that people are trying to make things right. Ironically the worst of times brings out the best in people and we have seen many brave people in rescue teams, people cleaning up after floods and the stoicism of the Japanese people. People do try to care and put things right and these practical examples are

comforting to all of us including adolescents. Here at Marsden I have addressed all students about the events and the need if required to listen to the few Japanese students in our community. Many teachers have fielded questions in class and have answered with candour and facts and sympathy. Our wonderful SRC has also held a fundraising day for victims as well that has alerted students to the issue and provided an avenue to show they can do something.

So many caring great students at Marsden makes me proud to be Head Teacher Welfare at Marsden.
