THANK YOU!:

As this is the final newsletter for 2017 I would like to thank all staff, students and parents for your immense contribution to our school. 2017 has been a fantastic year! Our school community has achieved outstanding results academically, through sports, culturally in Creative and Performing Arts, wellbeing and leadership.

HOW GOOD ARE OUR YEAR 12 STUDENTS?!:

Our HSC results were released Thursday December 14 and we are really proud of our year 12 2017 cohort:

- * 9 % of the individual results were Band 6 (90 100)
- * 28 % of the individual results were Band 5 (80 89)
- * 33% of the individual results were Band 4 (70 79)

70% of our student's individual results were either Band 4, 5 or 6 which is a 5% increase on last year's results. Whilst we did stagnate at 9% for individual results across Band 6 (equal to last year), we achieved 28% of individual results in Band 5 showing a 5% an increase when compared to last year. Further good news is that 19% of student's individual results were Band 3, which is an 8% decrease on last year. However, there is always room for a little improvement and the area we still need to work on is the 11% of individual results across Bands 1 and 2.

Overall the results are amazing and we are delighted with our students' achievements. They show significant improvement over 2016 and 2015, where we achieved 55% of individual results greater than Band 4. Since 2015 we have improved by an impressive 15%, moving the middle results upwards so that now 70% of individual results are Bands 4, 5 or 6.

I want to congratulation Year 12 and their teachers on the fabulous results.

A QUICK SUMMARY OF THE YEAR THAT WAS 2017:

2017 saw an unprecedented focus on 21st Century teaching and learning in our classrooms with the emphasis upon Chromebooks and Google drive. Student wellbeing was supported through structured mentoring programs delivered by RAISE, PCYC and Creating Chances. Our student leaders and staff worked on a whole school scale celebrating Harmony Day, Beyond Blue and White Ribbon Day. PB4L (Positive Behaviour 4 Learning) was a large part of our year as we re-introduced the program, including signage around the school, professional learning for our teachers, lessons on a Friday around key parts of wellbeing, organisation and socialisation; all of which are essential parts of the solution focussed model.

Transition for our students coming into high school was supported by WINGS, taster lessons, Science Club and Gala Days. The PINNACLE (GAT) team provided opportunities for our Year 7 2018 students by holding challenges over a number of days. The current PINNACLE students were tested in a variety of hands on activities and our PINNACLE showcases; with the year ending with the 'Pinnacle: An Evening with the Famous', a unique and provocative evening where students dressed as their favourite famous character and spoke to those in the audience about why their character was inspirational. Our S.T.E.M Team were focussed upon the delivery of our S.T.E.M curriculum in Year 8 ensuring students were engaged in a variety of real world problem solving challenges.

Not excluding the importance of any of the other fantastic programs which ran throughout the year, in the last month alone, the following very successful programs were participated in by students, teacher and parents: Australian Business Week for Year 10 students, Sports Assembly, Pink Stumps Cricket Challenge, Work Experience, Robotics, MADD Night, White Ribbon Day, Presentation Evening, Settling into High School Parent Presentation, Galileo Project Evening, Personal Best Assembly, Orientation Day and Chromebook/Google Classroom Information Evenings. We look forward to Tuesday's Sports Assembly and Year 12 2017 'Back to school' Morning Tea on Friday December 18.

REPORTS:

Yearly Reports for Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 were distributed over this last week. So you are aware, when students are given their reports, we have then read them in silence in year groups and complete a reflection of their strengths and areas for development. The emphasis upon the reflection is to get students to set goals for the upcoming year to focus upon. These are used by Year Adviser's and others throughout the year to assist students further in achieving their personal best at school.

I urge you to add the next layer of evaluation and support, by reading through the reports with your child and compare the results with those received at the end of Term 2 this year. Ask your child what their goals for 2018 are, and as necessary discuss and rework these so they reflect a realistic direction. Hopefully, you will notice an improvement in skills and understandings. Throughout the year students have been encouraged to perform at their personal best and the report is one of the most telling indicators of that improvement. If you are concerned about anything on the reports please don't hesitate to contact the school and speak to the Year Adviser or Faculty Head Teacher for any subject results of concern.

GETTING OUR FIRE DAMAGE SORTED:

Whilst nothing too obvious has been happening in the fire affected areas of the school, lots has been happening behind the scenes. Engineers have been busy testing and planning for the repair work to start early into the new year. For those of you unaware, the cause of the fire was an electrical fault; this was determined by the nature of the motion sensor activations. We are hoping to have the school back into full operation towards the tail end of next year.

MANAGING DEPRESSION IN CHILDREN :

One in four kids over the age of 12 has significant depressive symptoms. For girls, depression generally appears between the ages of 11 through to about 14. For boys, depression generally appears between 12 and 16.

Signs your child may be suffering from depression - If you see a number of these problems starting to develop, it's time to ask the question, could this be a more significant emotional disturbance than general teenage moodiness or attitude?

- A persistently bad, often irritable mood Withdrawal
- Not experiencing pleasure
- Not reacting to the environment the same way
- Sleep disturbance
- Changes in behaviour, changes in sleep

and appetite, and the persistence of that state for more than a few days in a row, typically for some weeks

• Doing badly at school

• Not joining in with other social activities with other kids and withdrawing from peers

- Abusing drugs and alcohol
- Self-harm.

All had a good time. Our Library Monitors volunteer their own time to support the Library and ensure it runs at its full potential.


