HSC CELEBRATION MORNING TEA - YEAR 12 2018:

The HSC has finally concluded for this year and even though I had very mixed emotions on sign-out day, they looked so happy! I look forward to the HSC celebration morning tea with Year 12 2018 at 10:30 am in the Library on Friday 14 December. This is an opportunity to discuss with them their thoughts and ideas on the exams, how they felt they performed and what they would like to do in 2019. Many teachers are looking forward to this opportunity to catch up with the class of 2018.

YEAR 11 YEARLY REPORTS - HSC 2019:

Now is an important time to reflect on the feedback given by teachers in the Year 11 Yearly Reports. The 2019 HSC in 11 months may seem a long way off, however, the actions students take now can make a great positive impact on their HSC journey and their future beyond school.

In the coming weeks, Year 12 2019 students will be permitted to withdraw from certain subjects, but must continue to attend these classes until they have completed the study pattern change process and attendance rolls are amended. Students who wish to drop a specific course will be required to see Mr Wilson and then Mr Lustica to discuss their options and alternatives.

WHY ATTENDANCE MATTERS:

The vast majority of our students make really good choices about their schooling. However, regular absences are an observable early warning sign that students are at risk of falling behind. Early identification and intervention is critical in addressing problematic attendance issues and possible student disengagement from school. A young person missing one day a fortnight will miss four weeks in a year, and more than a year of school by Year 10.

If students miss school, it is often their reading comprehension that is affected, which impacts their ability to learn and keep up with their peers.

When parents make school attendance a priority, they help their son/daughter get better grades, develop healthy life habits, avoid risky behaviour and have a better chance of graduating from high school.

When students are absent for fewer days, their grades and reading skills often improve—even among those students who are struggling in school. Students who attend school regularly also feel more connected to their community, develop important social skills and friendships, and are significantly more likely to complete their HSC, setting them up for a strong future.

Since the introduction of our phone intervention program as part of the A.M. program, we have seen a 19% reduction in students arriving late to school from Term 3 to Term 4, 2018. This means that these students are now getting important information that teachers share in roll call such as: reminders of upcoming assessments, excursions, new school-wide rules, and career opportunities. They are now better prepared for future events and don't miss out!

STUDENT ATTENDANCE AND END-OF YEAR ARRANGEMENTS:

A reminder to parents, all students are to continue attending school until Wednesday 19 December 2018. If you wish your child to leave school early on this day please provide a written note so arrangements can be made by the office. We will not be able to make phone calls home to facilitate this on the day.

Your support in ensuring your child attends each day, in full school uniform, is very much appreciated.

YEAR 9 DIGITAL WAR PICTURE BOOKS:


Year 9 English students have been studying a new unit, 'Imagining the Unimaginable', a visual literacy unit with a focus on War Picture Books. Over the course of the unit, students were able to read and analyse a variety of visual texts and picture books, in order to understand how perceptions and representations of war has been perceived, conveyed and changed over time.

To extend their learning, students worked in groups to create their own Digital War Picture Book, using the Google Suite. Students had to compose a narrative that represented a perception of war, and then create a digital picture book collaboratively. Students were very creative and critical in their creations; to commemorate the 100 years of Remembrance Day, some students created their picture books that were dedicated to the fallen soldiers. There were also some metaphorical depictions of war, for example the Anzac's story depicted through two young children playing at home.

Student, Hayden Baker, stated "The digital picture book activity was a fun and engaging activity that allowed us to work together, using the Google Programs. My group's Digital War Picture Book was a fictional story about a soldier's eager desire to return home after the war to be reunited with his family".

Overall, the War Digital Picture Books were a success and allowed composer and readers to "imagine the unimaginable".






MARSDEN LEARNING ALLIANCE S.T.E.M SHOWCASE:

ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT

During Term 3 & 4 the students participated in a weekly mindfulness lesson from the program .b developed by the Mindfulness in Schools Project (MiSP).

Mindfulness involves training our attention to experience the present moment with greater curiosity and kindness. This helps us to not only appreciate what is going well but to respond more skilfully in the here and now to life's inevitable challenges. Students were exposed to different mindfulness exercises helping them to identify worries, respond rather than react, improve concentration and be in the zone, manage strong emotions and foster gratitude. I hope that the students enjoyed the lessons as much as I enjoyed working with them and that they have walked away from the experience with some skills they can call on when life gets tough.

YEAR 7 AND YEAR 10 CHINESE:

Year 7 and Year 10 Chinese classes attended an excursion at Sinofield (Blue Mountains) to experience hands on traditional Chinese cultural activities and immerse themselves in a Chinese-speaking environment.

Our first activity was trying out a Chinese yoyo called the 'Diabolo'. There are two sticks with a string attached in between and a yoyo shaped as a sand timer but with holes to make a wind noise. It looked very easy by video but in reality it was pretty difficult. I enjoyed this activity because it was fun to try something new and I've learnt some tips too.

Next for our second activity, we participated in a Chinese Tea Ceremony. A lady performed making a special tea in front of all of us using some tea powder, hot water and small cups and strainers. We had Jasmine Tea with some biscuits after. It was very interesting learning how they made the drink.

For our third activity, we learnt how to make dumplings. We received a small piece of dough with flour, rolled the sides and shaped it as a circle, added the filling, closed and folded the uncooked dumpling and finished! Most of us got to create two dumplings. I couldn't wait until they would become cooked.

While we waited for the dumplings to cook, we learnt how to do Chinese printing out of Chinese characters. All the printers were mostly wooden very large or super tiny. We got our wooden prints and put a small piece of paper on top, added some dabs of water and ink and done!

Once the dumplings were cooked we finally got to have lunch. For lunch we all had chao fan (fried rice) and our jiaozi (dumplings), it was delicious!! It was one of the best meals I've ever eaten.

For our last activity, we did dragon dancing. There were two long colourful dragons lead by two teams of us. There was also a large drum that some of us played. There was tall sticks attached below the dragon for us to hold to control the movements of the mystical creature.

I had so much fun at our 2018 Chinese excursion and I hope we can come back again soon!

The students were able to experience an authentic Korean environment and immersion in Korean language and culture through stimulating 'Language and culture' activities.


