ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL

Parents and carers of children of compulsory school age are responsible for ensuring their child attends school every day. On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstances e.g. attending a funeral

Families are encouraged to organise family trips only during school vacation periods. Every day away from school negatively affects achievement levels. Families planning to take their children out of school for a family trip outside of school vacation periods will be required to apply for leave by completing an Application for Extended Leave – Travel which is available from our front office. SCHOOL OPAL CARDS

All students must be in possession of a valid Opal card or pay a fare. Students in possession of an Opal card must also tap on/off with their card when boarding buses to and from school.

As part of the campaign against fare evasion, and the ongoing commitment to provide the level of service needed to transport students to and from school. STA conducts regular checks of School Opal cards. This is important, because the Opal data collected determines the level of service they are able to provide to our school. If students don't tap on and off, the services will appear underutilised and may be considered for cancellation based on low passenger numbers.

Some teachers will be working on developing Project-Based Learning Hubs to enrich learning for Year 7 classes in Semester 2, as students collaborate and create to solve real-life problems. Other teachers will work in partnership with Macquarie University in the development of research projects for publication. Others will develop Action Research or Peer Mentoring projects to inform change within the school, in diverse areas including curriculum, wellbeing and extra-curricular activities. The school's executive are striving to provide opportunities for staff to pursue their areas of interest as it is only when teachers are learners themselves that a school can truly be said to have a 'growth mindset'.

Finally, I would like to thank our Head Teacher Learning and Wellbeing, Deb Prince, and the whole Learning and Wellbeing team for their dedication to the students in our school with Learning Difficulties and diagnosed conditions. Learning and Support Teachers (LaSTs), Student Learning Support Officers (SLSOs), careers advisers and the counsellor all ensure that students who require personalised learning plans (PLPs) and adjustments are well-cared for. All PLPs are currently being updated for 2019 and staff are undergoing professional learning in a range of wellbeing priority areas. There is still a lot of work that will be undertaken by this team as the year proceeds but there is a great team in place that really does care. YEAR 8 SCIENCE - TECHNOLOGY - ENGINEERING - MATHS (STEM)

Students in year 8 have been busy completing mini projects in their STEM classes this term. Completed over one or two lessons, the projects have included paper towers, paper planes, spaghetti towers and balloon powered cars. Each project is designed to enhance problem solving skills, as students collaborate in small groups to share ideas and produce an item that meets the conditions and expectations of the project.

Building the tallest paper tower using only twenty A4 pieces of paper and no sticky tape in sight, proved to be a fun and surprisingly challenging task. An understanding of balancing the load and a steady hand were the secrets to success.







Everyday household items were used to build a car powered by an inflated balloon. When the air from the balloon escapes, potential energy is converted to kinetic energy and Newton's third Law of Motion is at work – for every action there is an equal but opposite reaction.
