FEEDBACK FROM THE EDUCATION FORUM

Last Friday I attended the Chatswood Education Forum for Principals 2019 where the Secretary of the Department of Education (DoE), Mark Scott, former CEO of the ABC, emphasised the current priorities of DoE schools. Murat Dizdar and Georgina Harrison, both Deputy Secretaries, also spoke towards achieving the vision of seeing improved performance in every school, for every student, every teacher, every leader, every year. Their message emphasised clearly the need for every child to be known, valued and cared for.

Mr Scott outlined that teachers and schools have a commitment to nurture, guide, inspire and challenge students -it means having confidence each individual child will be known and understood, and their individual potential developed. As students progress, it means knowing that they are well supported as increasingly self-motivated learners - confident and creative individuals with the personal resources for future success and wellbeing.

Mr Dizdar further emphasised teachers' roles as leaders and the importance of them using information about individual student's capabilities and needs to plan for their learning so as to engage them in rich learning experiences, developing the vital skills for flourishing – now and in future years. Excellent leaders have a commitment to fostering a schoolwide culture of high expectations and a shared sense of responsibility for student engagement, learning, development and success. Whilst there is nothing new in the vision and direction being put forward, it was refreshing to see a clear emphasis upon the quality of leadership within the Department and especially within schools.

THE MIND OF THE LEADER

Mark Scott especially focused upon the mindset of leaders and the importance this plays in schools to bring about the necessary change to build the DoE's vision of every child being known, valued and cared for. A third of the day was centred on extensive research from the book "The Mind of the Leader". The conclusion of the research is that organisations and leaders aren't meeting employees' basic human needs of finding meaning, purpose, connection, and genuine happiness in their work. By applying this to schools, it becomes obvious that we will not achieve the DoE vision if we don't change how we lead. The research Mr Scott drew on outlined:

- 77% of leaders think they do a good job of engaging their people.
- 88% of employees say their leaders do a bad job with engagement.
- 65% of employees would forego a pay raise to see their leaders sacked.

And all this despite the fact that \$46 billion is spent each year on leadership development.

Rather than focus upon the problem the DoE sees the solution as putting people at the centre of their strategy. The message to those present was very clear – schools must have leadership structures which develop leaders who have three core mental qualities: Mindfulness, Selflessness, and Compassion; in other words high levels of emotional intelligence. Growth mindset leadership focuses around being mindful, selfless and compassionate as a person builds a more genuine approach. This builds a culture of belonging and engagement.

PUTTING OUR STUDENTS' WELLBEING FIRST

This term we welcome Jemma Taylor our Youth Worker. Jemma brings a broad range of training and experience to add to the wellbeing supports for our students. Jemma's role involves:

- Developing supportive relationships with young people and their families characterised by mutual respect, trust and confidence.
- Providing practical support to meet the key needs/goals of identified young people.
- Assisting our young people to achieve set goals by providing services including advocacy, advice, support and referrals to other services, working with the Head Teacher Learning Support and Wellbeing.
- Communicating directly with the school community through regular speaking engagements at student assemblies, P&C meetings, parent Information sessions, staff meetings and Learning and Wellbeing team meetings to update students, staff and parents about the positive difference the youth worker role makes to 'at risk' young people.
- Establishing and maintaining contacts with other support agencies who can work with Marsden High School collaboratively to deliver better outcomes for our young people.
- Maintaining confidentiality in regard to all information and data collected.
- Working within a framework of negotiated autonomy and report regularly to the Head Teacher Learning Support and Wellbeing.

GEARING UP WITH HOMEWORK

Homework is an important aspect of learning in high school. Although there has been some research that suggests that homework is of limited value, this is in the context of primary schools. High school homework has been found to be increasingly positive, particularly as students get older and move into their senior years of high school. At this time, I particularly encourage Year 10 students to review their homework and study patterns to ensure that good habits are in place for the senior school.

The Department of Education has provided a research summary in regards to homework and below are some of the comments/findings from the various studies:

- As students grow older, homework has a growing effect on achievement outcomes.
- Homework effort and conscientiousness were systematically related over time (Grade 5 to Grade 8). Most importantly, students who invested more effort in their homework showed more positive development in conscientiousness.

- One study shows a positive relationship between homework and a range of self-regulation skills that facilitates academic achievement and performance. It reveals that homework assignments can enhance the development of self-regulation processes and self-efficacy beliefs, as well as goal setting, time management, managing the environment, and maintaining attention.
- Homework helps students develop good study habits, such as goal setting, following directions, organising materials, planning ahead, and budgeting time, as well as strategies for dealing with mistakes, difficulties and distractions.
 Homework fosters student initiative and independence.

 Homework helps students develop positive

attitudes toward school and a sense of personal responsibility. Homework promotes greater parental appreciation of and involvement in schooling.

- Middle school students doing less than 90 minutes of homework per night did better academically than students who did no homework.
- When parents are not actively involved in assisting in homework tasks, then the literature indicates indecisive or negative results. However, when parents are directly involved in assisting their children during homework tasks, then positive correlations were found throughout the literature, in particular when parents support the child's understanding of homework.

HOMEWORK AND HOME-STUDY AT MARSDEN HIGH SCHOOL

Firstly, when specific homework is set by teachers, our expectation is that it is always done with a serious effort and completed on time – not a rushed last minute effort. Secondly, it should be noted that some homework is linked to a long term assignment. This needs careful planning to ensure the assignment is worked on systematically over the weeks, ensuring that when class time is available the student is in a position to seek help and clarification. Such work should not mean a late night the day before it is due with the inevitable unnecessary stress. Some homework is linked to the 'flipped' classroom; the simpler background or introductory work is done at home before the more difficult aspect is taught in class. All set homework is essential in order to keep up with and understand classwork.

Even when no specific homework has been set, there is always home-study that should take place each day to maintain good learning habits and build up skills. For example, work from each subject for the day should be reviewed and checked for accurate completion and to ensure understanding. In English, students are expected to read regularly each day as this builds up fluency, comprehension and vocabulary development.

Additionally, in Years 7 to 10 students can log into Wordflyers to assist with grammar, spelling and vocabulary. In Maths, as well as set homework, students can access Hot Maths in the junior school for additional work at their competency level. For seniors in all subjects, regularly reviewing content, note taking, summaries, memorising and practice responses are essential to learning. For many subjects seniors can also access our senior student tutor, Ms Berynk for tutorials and practice questions. At Marsden High School the Homework Club runs in the library on Mondays and Thursdays between 3.15 pm and 4.30 pm. The library is open from 8.15 am each day and is staffed by trained teachers.

WATER CHILLERS - WHEN CAN I FILL UP?

The school has several new water machines that offer chilled water. Many students now bring a bottle to take advantage of this great initiative from our P&C. Students are welcome to fill their bottles before school and during breaks, ensuring that they arrive at roll call and class on time.

APPROPRIATE USE OF MOBILE PHONES

When students are sick or injured, they are to report to the front office. The office staff or a Deputy Principal will call home once a student is assessed in sick bay or in any emergency. Calling parents directly on mobile phones is not an alternative to our school procedures for sick or injured students.

Mobile phones must remain off and away during class time, in assemblies, and in the library, and they must be turned off and in bags during in-class assessments, tests and final exams. Not adhering to these rules and procedures may result in disciplinary action, including confiscation of the mobile phone or device.

Text messaging and answering calls during class is disruptive, is not permitted, and may also result in disciplinary action.

Please be courteous when using mobile phones/devices at school at other times and set them to "silent" or use headphones. Finally, a reminder that Bluetooth speakers are not permitted at school.



UNIFORM

All students are required to follow school uniform policy and wear correct uniform travelling to and from school. Thank you to parents/carers for ensuring their student leaves home in the correct attire every day.

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During Terms 2 and 3, ties must be worn by Year 11 and 12 students. As the weather gets cooler, I would strongly recommend that families locate the correct school jumper and plain white under garments to layer for warmth. Hoodies and all other non-Marsden jackets (including commemorative Year 12 jackets from previous Year Groups) are not permitted. The school sells a black MHS scarf for added warmth. All uniform clothing items are available from our school uniform shop.

Please note that black leather lace up school shoes must be worn to school every day, except for Years 8, 9 and 10 on Tuesday when the school sport uniform may be worn to school. Students undertaking practical TAS and Science lessons on Tuesdays must bring their leather school shoes for safety compliance in these lessons.




MARSDEN ENVIRONMENT TEAM

This term the Marsden Environment Team (MET) are doing something special and are creating a recycled artwork by using plastic bottles, rubbish and caps from around the school grounds. The purpose of this canvas artwork is to illustrate the harm of plastic pollution on marine life in our oceans and the importance of recycling and disposing of our waste responsibly.

Furthermore, on the 5th of June this year is World Environment Day and this year the theme is air pollution so the MET are planning to take action by planting trees in our school grounds to help celebrate this important event. In addition to World Environment Day, the MET have also introduced new functional paper bin recycling system to our school for every classroom. As a team we have learnt that approximately 25% of Australia's current landfill waste items could be recycled but are not. Additionally, for every 1 tonne of paper that is recycled, we can save around 26,000 litres of water. We hope that our new recycle bin system will help our school decrease our landfill footprint and turn our recycled waste into sustainable products.


SCHNEIDER ELECTRIC'S DESIGNATHON
